

Garden Report: November 2021

Monitoring:

 CoCoRaHS rain gauge watchers reported 1.28 inches of precipitation which is well below the average for October, which is 3.68 inches.

Observations of note:

November interest: Though not as vibrant as in years past, fall colors finally arrived with RORG's trees and shrubs turning to shades of red and yellow. Throughout the abnormally dry month, several species of plants continued to bloom including 'Rozanne' Geranium, Smooth Blue Aster, and one very late Cardinal Flower. Finches were observed eating seed from Rosinweed, and Question Mark Butterflies were seen sunning themselves on RORG's groundcover of sedges.
